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Pumpkin Teapot Napkin Ring

The design on your project will be different from the one shown here in the step-by-step instructions, but all instructions are the same for all napkin rings.

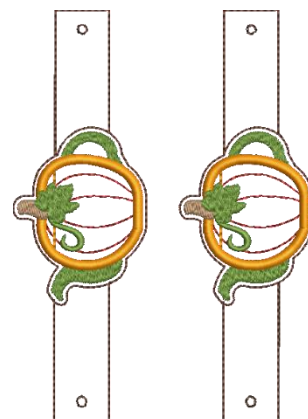


This project is 100% made in the hoop. They also fold flat for storage!

Stitches: 6851
Height: 6.05
Width: 4.37
Colors: 7
Stops: 8

Finished Size for One:
 6 1/4 x 2 inches

Makes 2 napkin rings!



Supplies for two napkin rings:

5 1/2 x 7 1/2 inch piece of vinyl

5 1/2 x 7 1/2 inch piece of felt, vinyl, or any other non-fraying fabric for backing

TEAR-AWAY stabilizer, a piece big enough for you to completely hoop (I use Pellon 806)

Embroidery thread, your choice of colors

Your finishing thread should match or compliment your background color and backing fabric color.

Two sets of snaps, KAM Snaps were used in this project

General supplies:

5 x 7 hoop, scissors, tape, embroidery needles, embroidery machine

You will also need:

Embroidery thread, (your choice of colors), Embroidery needle, size 11 (I use Organ 15X1ST)

Your thread on the last two stitchings should match your background fabric color.

Instructions:

Unzip, then load the file into your machine. Hoop the stabilizer and attach hoop to machine. Do not put the vinyl on yet. The first stitching will be your placement stitches. You will stitch this right on the stabilizer. It doesn't really matter what color you use, because you will never see it. This is just so you know where to place your vinyl.



Remove the hoop from machine. Place your vinyl fabric on top of your placement stitches. Be sure that you leave at least a quarter inch away from stitching for your margin which you will cut away later. Secure your vinyl (right side should be facing up) to the stabilizer and hoop to keep it in place. You can use scotch tape or painter's tape.

Stitch through the various color changes up until the last one. These are the details of your design. Before stitching the last color, remove the hoop from the machine.



Place your backing fabric over the stitches you see on the underside of the hoop. Again, leave at least a quarter inch margin, and the right side (if you have a "right" side) should be facing up. Secure in place with tape. Stitch your last set of stitches.

Remove from the machine and the hoop. Cut the piece into two individual sections. Tear your stabilizer from between your fabrics. Carefully cut all the way around each piece. Keep your cutting within 1/8 of an inch from the stitches.

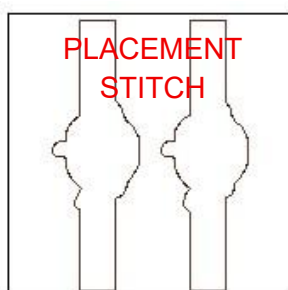


You will now attach your snaps. Apply them using the instructions that came with your snaps and special pliers. Just make sure that one of the snap tops (the smooth circle) is facing the outside of the napkin ring, and the other snap across from it, the shiny side is facing the inside.

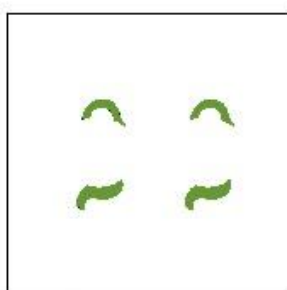
TIP: If you plan to use these on paper napkins and plastic utensils, place the snaps closer to the design so it will be a tighter fit. You can even add an additional snap closer to the design if you prefer.

Makes a great addition to your outdoor or ultra casual events!

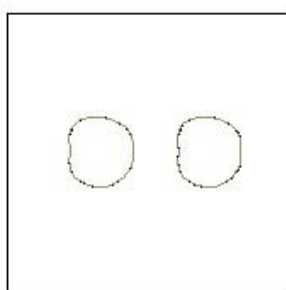

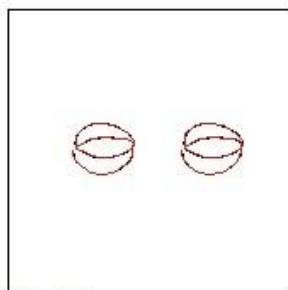

Your project contains applique.

Placement Stitch - You will stitch this out so you will know where to place your applique fabric. Make sure it completely covers the stitching. If there is more than one area to cover, you can use just one piece of fabric, unless they are different colors, then you can use both. Just be careful that the second or third fabric doesn't move when the needle shifts from one area to the other.

Tack-down Stitch - You will stitch this onto the applique fabric that you just placed over the placement stitching. After you have stitched the fabric down, remove the hoop from the machine (DO NOT remove FABRIC from hoop), then cut away all the excess fabric close to the stitching line. Return hoop to the machine and continue to the next step

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If you change the size or density of the original design, you could alter the final result.
